"... There is yet one man, Micaiah the son of Imlah, by whom we may enquire of the LORD: but I hate him; for he doth not prophesy good concerning me, but evil..." (1 Kings 22:8)

Micaiah told King Ahab that God would destroy him in the battle. King Ahab commanded that Micaiah be put in prison until he got back from the battle. But King Ahab died in that battle as God's true prophet, Micaiah, had prophesied. An arrow directed by God pierced him between the joints of his armor.

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
